COLLOSSAL FORTUNES FOR CANADIAN HEIR

Mr. R. Honeywell, of Ottawa city, has been on a visit to Kingston during the past week, mainly for the purpose of consulting with Mrs. Thomas Robinson and others in reference to that immense fortune in the United States to which Mrs. Robinson and other hetrs have for some time past laid claim. Mr. Honey well and Mrs. Robinson are first cousins, and it is said that, in comparing notes on this subject of mutual interest, they in common with other Canadian heirs the estate, have become more than eve convinced of the validity of their clair and of the probabilities of succes in pressing their suit. It may be uninteresting to revert just now t the salient features of this remarkable case. Three generations ago the only children-two married daughters -of Colonel William Baker migrated from the States to Canada and settled near the Rideau in the Ottawa region. In process time two unmarried brothers of Colonel Baker-like himself soldiers of the Re volutionary war-died, leaving to him the large properties which they had amassed and which, with his own, he bequeathed to his daughters at his death in the year 1801. Owing to some ignorance, either of the whereabouts or of the demise of their father, the daughters at the time laid no claim to the property which has in the three quarters of a century that has since elapsed become enormously enhanced value. About thirty grand-children Hannah and Betsy Baker now survive in Canada and Northern New York, and are joint claimants to the estates, which, it now transpires, were definitely willed the above named daughters of Col.
