He stated they were making their own bills for debts due the bank, that there were out standing habilities as follows : Deposits \$1,400,000, of which about \$700,000 is due to the general public, while the circulation has been reduced to \$650,000. The reduction in liabilities from 8th of July to 28th July, amounted to \$1,492,-781 in deposits, and \$120,000 in circulation. The rate to be paid for bills has not been filed. The brokers speak of 70 cents, while a bank manager requested your correspondent to advise the public not to accept less than 90 cents. Mr. Campbell was reticent in speaking of possibility of the early redemption. Nine agencies of the band have been recently wound up, other banks taking deposits and no loss or meonvenience will accrue to depository in these places.
