VINDICATED VICTIMS OF TORY TYR-ANNY.

Political history, like all other kinds has a tendency to repeat itself, and the recent attempt to degrade Hou. Letellies de St. just, may yet prove an illustration of this pretty well established rule. The "brute force majority" of the present House of Commons is dominant and domi neering enough just now, but its triump may prove to be short-lived for all that It is not so long since a similar Tory majority in the Parliament before las summoned Hon, Mr. Anglin to the Ba of the House, there to reprimand him for having spoken out strongly in hi Freeman against the Pacific Scandal. On the strength of Sir John Macdonald false asseverations of innocence that afterwards proven crime, Hon. Mr. Anglin was rebuked by the Speaker of the day. But retribu tion and justification were not long de layed. Although the Tory gentry, in cluding our high-toned member for Frontenac, publicly declared their intention ostracise him from their genteel society very soon thereafter every word he had

uttered was proven to be true; and while many of those who voted him the insuiof a parliamentary snubbing were defeated at the polls, not only was Mr. Anglin returned to Parliament but he was twice prisoner stood up. The first charge over elected to fill the high station-Speaker, and to preside over such of his maligners as had managed to scramble back into parliament again. Similar ly, when Hon. Mr. Joly was in opposition he was cammoned be fore the Bar of the House, and reproved by the Speaker fo having characterized as the "brute force majority" the then triumphant Tories who so richly deserved the designation. In this case, too, the vindication of the accused was swift and complete. Now it is the Hon. Mr. Letellier's turn to be placed under the ban of Tory displeasure. They have violated the Constitution to wreak temporary vengeance upon him. But the end is not yet. This is the hour of apparent Tory triumph. As in the instances cited above, however, the ascendancy of Tory

dispossessed Lieutenant-Governor, altho bounced for the moment from his true position by the Federal tyrants, is yet firmly entrenched in the public contidence and gratitude. Already, as in the foregoing instances, are the people pre paring to do him the honor he so well deserves at their hands. While the Tory Chieftain has been literally hooted from the country by the execrations of the people whose rights he has trampled in the mire, the public sympathy is spontaneously going out to the victim of his malignity. Never was the Hon, Mr. Letellier so strong in the public confidence as now. Popular feeling is on every

hand outbursting in his favor, and as in the cases of Hon. Messrs.
