The directors are trying to cast all the blame of the catastrophe upon ex Manager Reney, whom they accuse of deceiving them as to the actual state of affairs. All the losses were confined to the head office here and the Toronto branch. The following firms, which have failed here within the past two or three weeks have taken about \$11,500,000 of the bank's funds.


