HALF-BREEDS CAPTURED.

Lot of Canadians Taken by U. S. Troops.

Washington, D.C., Aug. 8. - Several days ago, General Terry reported that Colonel Miles had captured, north of the Mississippi river, a lot of half-breed Canadians, who are charged with selling liquor and ammunition in the Indian country of the United States. A portion of these are females. Among the property captured is 143 carts and 149 horses. The question as to what disposition is to be made of the captured men. women and property has been under consideration by the State, War, and Interior Departments, and probable will be decided to-morrow. In a telegram received at the War Department from General Sheridan on the subject, that officer says the Canadian half-breeds captured by Colonel Miles have been sent to Fort Buford. General Terry wants to know what to do with them. They are a bad set. If Miles can prove they trade whis key and ammunition to the Indians. cannot we turn the men over to the United States Marshal for trial before the District Court, and send the women

Fort Peck, via Buford, Aug, 9 .- Gen. Miles has arrived here. He has virtually carried out the wishes of the authorities at Washington, having driven the hostiles to the line and captured all the half breeds who roam in that section of the country between this point and Wood Mountain, and he has now divided his command for the protection of the fron tier. Among those leaving with funds were old, infirm, and blind, some of whom had to be carried there. The number of depositors is about 20,000. When interviewed this morning Mr. Barbeau, man ager, said he only wished that all who had any doubt of the stability of the Bank, would come on, as he did not desire to keep their deposits. It is no secret that they obtained \$1,000,000 of the Bank of Montreal notes yesterday. Small depositors are being paid in these, and the large ones in checks on the Bank of Montreal. A large number of people assembled around the doors of the Bank this morning about 9 o'clock. The greater number apparently were spectators in anticipation of a "scene." The Bank large dty Yard.
