A writer over the non de plume 'Parliamentum' is contributing a series of able letters to the Globe on the Letellier dismissal. In the last of these it is pointed out that that principle of British law formulated in the fair play maxim, that "no prisoner shall be condemned unheard or undefended," has been grossly violated in the case of the ex Lieutenant Governor. He was arbitrarily dismissed without being accorded that opportunity of self-defence which is granted even to the vilest of criminals charged with the most heinous of offences. The offence itself, even for which he was punished, was not specified, but instead thereof the lying allegation was inserted that his "usefulness was gone." Such an addition as this was insult to injury, was not merely a gross injustice to the immediate victim of Tory malevolence in the case, but was an insult also to the common sense of His Excellency, whose signature to death-warrant was equally cruel and false and unjust. A day of reckoning will ere long overtake the tyrante, who, in their indecent haste to indulge in a political revenge, have condemned unheard a man whose only offence was the fearless and patriotic discharge of an imperative public duty.

If we may accept such a usually staid and reliable authority, as the Journal of Commerce is reputed to be in financial matters, the criminal revelations of the Glasgow Bank are likely to find their counterpart in connection with the re cent failures of Canadian Banks. Those are really guilty of breach of trust, and who abuse the public confidence by putting the funds entrusted to their care to fraudulent or improper uses, are deserving of the severest censure and punishment, Organized and incorporated robbery is certainly not entitled to extenuation because its frauds are perpetrated upon a wholesale scale. The fact that its victims are legion is no reason why the victims of mismanagement and dishonesty should escape the penalty to which common theft is amenable. We hope, for their own and the country's credit, that these grave suspicions may be lifted from the now suspected parties, but there should be no whitewashing. If fraud has been perpetrated let it be unhesitatingly expeased and rigorously punished.
