



NHUMAN TREATMENT OF NIHILIST PR ONERS-CAGED LIKE WILL INTO US The Telegraph tells the cory the

morning. Ita Vienna correspondent "During the second fortnight of Tas month a person whose testimony is above suspicion, visited a ship at an Golden Lion Grocery. chor at Odessa, litte | out for the trans port of Nihilist convicts to Saghalien. He describes it as a man-of-war of about four thousand tons. On going below deck he found that on either side of a narrow passage, iron barred cages had been constructed, exactly similar to those used for wild animals. These cages were of different sizes, and contained from four to twenty convicts each. The rule was that such as showed any disposition to be unruly were confined in the smaller cages so as to be more easily watched He estimates the number of these wretched people at 750, most of whom had come by rail from the interior heavily chained together. They were to keep their chains during the journey, and the sinister noise they produced was dismetly audible long ere he reached the slup. Unable to control his feelings he observed to the officer in command that his closely packed cargo, chained together in a place where there was absolutely no ventilation, would never survive the pass age of the Suez Canal, the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean. To which the officer cynically replied, "Well, so much the better for all parties " He accompanied this astounding remark by a significant glance,

Don't you understand that is precisely what we expect ?" The same ship was visited at another place on her outward voyage, and it was ascertained that not one-third of the unfortunate prisoners could reach their destination alive. But my information is not confined to this one instance. The Nijni-Novgorod, formerly the Saxonia, of the Hamburg and New York line of teamers, since purchased for the Russian volunteer fleet, arrived at Port Said, un der Russian colours, at the end of last month. She had 590 convicts on board, for the most part Nihilista condemned to the Island of Saghalien. The Canal Company raised the question as to whether this ship, known to have sailed under merchant colours on her last journey to Odessa and which belong neither to the Rossian Government nor to the Russian transport service, should be considered as a ship of war. The question just raised caused a stoppage of three days, during which the convicts on board were literally left to roast in the heat, which, at this time of year, is terrible. Their torture was prolonged for seventy two mortal hours, because the Russian authorities hoped to decove the Company. The same vessel is to perform the same voyage with a similar cargo four times in the present year, and other ships are engaged in the same traffic.

It has been reported that 250 persons had died on one of these ships, and that The Largest, Cheapest and Best 150 had been landed in a dying condition. A COLOSSAL FRAUD.

THE REVENUE CHEATED OUT OF \$300,000 - SYSTEMATIC TRAFFIC IN LIQUOR CAR

A considerable amount of excitement and speculation was created last winter in Hamilton on the seizure by the Government of the vinegar factory of Lewis D. Birely, who was suspected of having defrauded the revenue of large sums . ! money. Owing to the escape of the orineipal and his accomplices, the facts of the case were never fully made public, but the particulars of the whole matter are published.

The factory was founded and built on James street by the late Norris F. Birely. who carried on the business up to September, 1878, when he was burned to death in the fire at Reid's warehouse. It was often suspected that he carried on AN ILLEGAL BUSINESS,

by the fact that he undersoid the Toronto manufacturers in the same line. After his death the vinegar factory was conducted by his brother. Lawis D. Birely. who continued the business up to the date of the seizure by the Government. It was then stated that the revenue had been defrauded on

A GIGANTIC SCALE,

The accusation led to the prosecution of Birely and his brother in-law, Brown, and also of Stewart, the excise officer, and McKinnon, the foreman in the factory. McKinnon saved himself by turning Queen's evidence, but Bire ly and Brown left for the United States before they could be arrest ed The excise officer Stewart was taken into custody and brought before the Police Magistrate, but on the case being renranded, he was allowed to go out on bail to the amount of \$5,000. He was never heard of again, and before leaving the city he provided for the payment of his bondsmen to the amount of the penalty. The Government then contiscated the stock and plant of the factory, and offered them for sale. Two offers vere made, one of \$2,800 by R. R. Waddell, the attorney and confidential advizer of N. F. Birely, and another of \$4,300

by a Mr Sutherland. The highest tender was accepted. True bills were found against both Birely and Brown at the last Sessious. and Birely's sureties on the bond to the Government were compelled to pay the penalty on the bond. It is supposed that the late N F Birely told his secret method of making money to some of his confidential friends and relatives, and it is therefore not surprising that the necessary capital and then were forthcoming continuo so lucrativo a business. HOW THE FRAUD WAS EFFECTED. The factory, which was a bonded one, con-

sisted of two flats, in the upper of which

the manufacture of methylated spirits and vinegar was conducted. In the lower flat was situated the shipping office. The whole was in charge of Excise Officer Stewart, whose duty it was at night to lock up the mixing room or the upper floor, and to test the contents of barrels before thay were shipped. The hoist used to convey the spirits to the mixing room was also locked before the officer left the premises. The plan adopted by the confederates was to horst to the mix ing room ten barrels of spirits during the day for the estensible purpose of mixing with wood naptha to convert it into methylated spirits. They then subsequent y let down tive barrels of methylated spirits, and placed them in the shipping office. As soon as the officer had left the factory at evening, they drew up the five parrels of methylated spirits through a secret trap they had cut in the ceiling and poured the contents into the mixing tub. Five barrels of the pure spirits were then transferred into five barrels labelled methylated spirits, which were then lowered into the shipping office. On the return of the officer in the morning, he found the barrels of methylated spirits in the shipping office apparently as he had lett them, and allowed them to be carted away on payment of the duty on methy lated spirits. In order, however, to guard against the contingency of the officer Stewart testing the contents of the barrels before they were shipped, he was allowed a consideration of Sob a week in addition to his salary of \$700 a year. The operation was repeated every day, and on the average thirty barrels of pure spirits were disposed of in this way every week. The duty on the spirits being \$1.65 a gallon, and on methylated spirits only 22 cents a gailon, it will easily be seen that the Government lost \$1.43 in every gallon, \$42.90 a bar rel, \$214 50 a day, \$1,287 a week, and if, as is suspected, these frauds have been revenue has been cheated of some hundreds of thousands of dollars In order to make things look square on the visit of the Inspector, the books were balanced by means of entries of fictitious sales of methylated spirits and vinegar. Notwith standing the protection afforded by the complicity of the excise officer Stewart. suspicions were often entertained in regard to the factory, and on one occasion Stewart was withdrawn for three weeks. and Arnold, a respectable but guildless official, sent in his place. The confeder ates did not take the trouble to attempt to bribe Arnold. Immense quantities of spirits were obtained from Mesars. Good erham & Worts, and it is said that R. R. Waddeli's name is in Birely's bond to that firm for \$4,000, which is held for an indebtadness of over that amount now due. It is believed that, in addition to Brown, McKinnon & Stewart, the carter who delivered the spirits was also a paid accomplice. The crash, however, came at last, and Mckinnon betrayed his ac complices. It seems that they had got so reckless and confident of escaping detection that on some occasion they ship ped spirits to other parties without going through the formality of conveying it to the mixing room, and entered it in their books as having been manufactured by them. The fraud would not, of course, have been possible but for the connivance of Stewart, as if he had tested the bar-
