Detroit, Mich., Aug. 26 - The Western Division of the Chicago and Lake Huron Railway was sold in front of the Post Office, at noon to-day, by special Master-Commissioner Addison Mandell, under Chancery foreclosure. The only bid received was one of \$300,000 from Henry W. Smithers, who appeared on behalf of himself, Joseph Hickson, E. W. Maddaugh and W. F. Whitehouse as purchase trustees for the Grand Trunk Railway. The conditions of the sale are identical with those which governed the sale of the East Division several months ago, and need not be repeated.
