

## WHY FISH DIE.

SETH GREEN, who is a recognized authority on matters relating to fish culture, has given his opinion why so many fish have died lately in Lake Ontario. In the year 1870, the New York Fish Commissioners put some young shad in the tributaries of this lake, and in the following year the fish were plentiful in the rivers where they were placed. In 1873 some young shad were caught in Lake Ontario, and during the same year the alewife made its appearance in the same waters, and were generally mistaken for shad. They came in such numbers that fishers thought it a great mystery, and during the summer months many of them died. Mr. Green has devoted a good deal of time to an examination of the cause, and expresses himself satisfied that the alewife starved to death. This fish go in large schools, and those can find food enough in the kind they eat to last, but a small percentage of them, Mr. Green says, "In all our examinations I have scarcely ever found food of any kind in any of them that were caught in nets, and those that I found dead were very poor, and starvation was the cause." It is the same with fish as with cattle—put more in a pasture than there is food for, and all the weak ones will die. It is the same with the pond of water is their pasture. The alewife made its first appearance in Lake Ontario in the fall, and those that followed up the St. Lawrence river, and they, coming on the same principle, did a great deal of sheep going over a fence if one goes the flock follows. It is the same with pigeons; when the old ones think the young are old enough to fly, she pushes them out on a limb, and flies out and leaves them. The old one may go a thousand miles, and as soon as the young get strong enough to stand the journey, they will follow the old ones and join them, no matter what the distance is from Ontario.
