### A New Delicacy.

A new Australian delicacy is finding its way into the London markets in the shape of dried kangaroo tongues. The tails and skine of these animals have long been utilized-the former for making soup, the latter for leather; and the recent enormous destruction of kangaroos has given considerable impetus to these two trades. Struck by the waste of food occasioned by the slaughter of so many thousands of these marsupials; whose bodies are frequently left where they have fallen, a Waroo settler made an experiment in curing the tongues of some of the slain, and so highly were they apeprong up in this commodity.
