Yesterday afternoon Edward McBrien was summarily tried before Judge Price for the robbery of Isaac Scott early on Saturday morning last. There was quite a number of persons present.

Mr. Scott repeated his statement in regard to the attack that had been made upon him, and the manner in which his pockets had been rifled.

Detective Macauley was examined and gave the grounds on which he had arrested McBrien, who was said by Scott to be one of the robbers.
