The November elections will more fully develop the present political temper of the nation, and more reliably indicate the probable result of the Presidential struggle of next year.

...... The case of the Communists of France bears a striking resemblance to that of the imprisoned Fenians in Ireland. The Governments in each case were disposed to deal generously with the culprits, but the friends of the latter were equally determined to be satisfied with nothing short of plenary anmesty. The popular demonstrations that are being held in favor of the still imprisoned Commu mata vividly recall the case of the Fenian martyrs excited amor g their compatriots. A recent Communist funeral was attended by over ten thousand persons. Not withstanding all these expressions of Communistic feeling, however, the French Government remains firm to its policy of judicious clemency and resists the violent ebullitions of feeling in favor of indiscriminate pardon. This course is the only safe one in such cases. The British Government assumed a similar attitude in the case of the Fenian pri soners, that of clemency, tempered with justice and dignity, and the French Government is wise to follow so safe and sen sible an example.
