> THE MILITARY RESOURCES of England on paper are: - In the United Kingdom, 105,000 reguliar troops, 134,500 militis. 14,830 yeomanry, 174,241 efficient volunteers, 15,000 first-class, and 21,000 second-class army reserve, making a total of 454,000 men. Of these, the active army, about 80,000 men of the militia ruserve, and the first class reserve, are alone liable to serve out of the country The British army in India is not to be taken into consideration in the estimates of forces available for a war on the Balkan peninsula, or about the Black Sea, for it has to remain in India for abvious reasons. It is stited from English sources that the paper estimate of 454,-000) would be reduced to about 100,000 men in case of actual war with a foreign power. Dogland's navy, however, is her strength. It numbers 98 iron-clads, 300 steamers, 170 sailing vessels, all available for war service. The iron-clads are all powerful ressets, some of them registered as high as 12,000 tons. A portion of this fleot is now at Busika Bay, at the foot of the Dardanelles, and within easy reach of constantinople.
