What may be called the war party is in power, and will be sure to look keenly after the national honour, which will be resolutely asserted should Russia presume too far on British forbearance and trench upon British interests. On the other hand, the strength and resolution of the Opposition will all be thrown into the scale against reckless and useless hostilities, and thus an impartial neutrality will be preserved.
