Resignation of Derby and Carnarvon-The British Fleet Under Orders --- The Russian Terms.

(By Telegraph To-day.) London, Jan. 25. - News in this moruing's papers seems slightly exaggerated. the natural result of the excitement of yesterday. It seems certain that Earl Sitting Bull.
