While the worthy Senator thu plainly hints at abolition of Parliamentary Government, at least while the present able Cabinet is in power, he would, in all our new communities, abolish Responsible Government altogether. Referring to the North-West he said: "That country could have been governed for many a year to come from Manitoba without the expense of maintaining the machinery of the Government at Battleford." In these expressions of his views on the question of Government the inveterate Tery instincts are quite sufficiently apparent. 
