

Wheat at Odessa.

The New York Produce Exchange Weekly says—"On the 14th ult., twelve steamers had arrived at Odessa; two of which had sailed for Sebastopol, carrying an aggregate tonnage amounting to 71,500 tons, equal to the carrying capacity for 2,500,000 bushels of wheat. Considerable quantities of grain had been sold at Odessa via Marseilles and England, with the conditions that the vessels were to be ready fifteen days after the final arrangement of the armistice. There were consequently several steamers en route for Odessa in addition to the twelve that had already arrived there. In addition to the already specified stocks of grain at Odessa and Nikolaev, which amounted to 96,000 quarters, equal to 7,872,000 bushels, there is said to be over a million quarters in Azov port, equal to 8,000,000 bushels, which may be taken to include the quantity available in the immediate island districts, the quality of which it is at least unsafe to reckon upon at present. There is also said to be a million quarters, or 8,000,000 bushels at railway stations ready to be transported to the seaboard."

## Orange Delegation.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. J. H. Macalfe, ex-Mayor of Toronto, W. J. Parkhill, Grand Master W.M., and P. Reynolds, forming an amateur delegation from the Orange Order, had an interview with H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, expressing their fealty to the Crown, and loyalty and affection for the person of the Sovereign, of whom he is the representative. The above gentlemen were this morning introduced by Mr. Bowell to Mr. Scott, Secretary of State, and then presented to him a portion addressed to the Government. It seems that the late disturbances in Quebec and the like have been taken by the Government to secure protection for the Orange men of Montreal, who propose to walk on the 12th of July next. It states further that if that protection is provided that it will not be necessary for the Orange men from Ontario to go to Montreal and see that their Quebec brothers are allowed to walk in procession.—Hamilton Times.
