(By Telegraph To-day.) GREAT BESTAIN.

Londor, March 18 .- Consols declined to-day on the rumour that Lord Derby had resigned. The rumour was probably of stock jobbing origin. The Morning Post congratulates the country on the unanimity of the Ministry in the present critical position.
