WELLAND CANAL, BIBLE MISSION WORK.

ston, has been in operation for twenty seven years, its object being the circula tion of the Bible, especially among the poor in Kingston and vicinity, and through the agency of a colporteur in some of the neighbouring townships As it was thought by some that the sphere of this Society interfered that of the Auxiliary Bible Society, was thought expedient to change its designation to that of "The Ladies Association for Bible Mission Work," commenced in March, 1877. To carry out the purposes of this Society, the collectors were requested to solicit subscriptions towards the support of the City Missionary for the whole year, instead of four months, as formerly. Mr. Jack began his work in convection with this Association in May, 1877, carrying the Bible and disposing of copies of the scriptures every month. He holds weekly or fort nightly meetings in various destitute parts of the city and suburbs, as follows Little's Lane, every Monday evening, where he has generally about twenty five; Barriefield, every alternate Friday evening, with an average attendance of 40; Grove Inn, every alternate Friday evening, with an average attendance of 20. He also helds a weekly meeting in his own house, on Thursday evening, where there are often as many as forty-five. These meetings are well attended, and much appreciated by the classes for which they are intended, and are countenanced by the ministers of the city, who take personal interest in the missionary's work. In addition to these, he holds a mission Sunday school in his own house, with an everage attendance of sixty from the surrounding neighbourhood in which he lives, and in this he is assisted by severa Christian ladies, and others who take an interest in the mission work. He also visits the Hospital and House of Industry, holding weekly services at these in stitutions. Much of his time is devoted to visiting the sick and destitute, reading the word of God, and praying with those who are unknown even to any minister, and making their wants known to those who can relieve them. Those who are acquainted with the circumstances of Kingston, know the great need and importance of the City mission, and it is
