Several landfords and agents were murdered, and special commissions were appointed to secure the arrest and punishment of offenders. In 1843 there were numerous conflicts between the police and the peasants. 1943 Mr. Waller and family were fired on by his tenants, and Mr. Waller and two others were killed. On the 6th of April, 1845, a rate collector was beaten to death on the public highway, and in the homicides were reported. In 1848 five convicted murderers were hanged, thirty other persons accused of crime were transported, and hundreds af peasants were confined in jul. In this year Robert Lindsay Mauleverer, a magis rate of Londonderry and agent of extensive estatos, was shot as he was driving home. In 1855 Miss Charlotte Hends, of Ballyconnel, was shot and fatally wounded as she was driving home. Thes was in

October, and before the end of November twenty cases of murder or murderous assault were reported. In one case, in 1862, a solicitor was shot dead at a hotel by one of a family upon whom he had served a Thibault was murdered on his grounds near Cahir, Tipperary. In April, 1868. Howard Fatherstonhaugh, Deputy Lies. tenant of the county of Westmeath, was dragged from his carriage and shot had been evicted; a Mr. Bradshaw was shot on his own lawn; and Captain Tarleton was shot on his own grounds at Athlone. During the same year James Hunter, a Scotch farmer, was shot while driving home with his family, and several other murders were committed.
