At 11 30 he fell asleep and slept almost an hour. When he awoke he complained of great pain about the heart, and sat up for some time. After this he continued getting worse, ing his faculties perfectly, and died with out a struggle. About half an hour before he died he called Carnochan, and suid, 'I have tried to do some good, if have not had good luck. I am not afraid to die. I believe theguardian angles will protect me.' It was just as the great bell on Easex Market struck the hour of noon that Tweed sank back dead on his pillow. His death was very quick. About a week took his bed, which he kept to his death.
