AMERICA—To-morrow the auction will open at noon. The business, so far as we can learn, will be light.

DONATIONS—The donations yesterday in Kingston R. C. parish amounted to over \$1,100, of which some \$1,086 were given at the two masses in the Cathedral.

PROMOTIONS—Kingston Field Battery of Artillery—To be 2nd Lieutenant, Battery Sergeant-Major Peter Graham Wilmut, G.S., vice John Wilmut, promoted.

IN MEMORIAM—Yesterday Sister Mary Patrick died at the House of Providence. The funeral service will be held in the Cathedral on Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock.

THE SPREAD—To-morrow evening the annual dinner of St. George's Society will take place, and the prospects are that there will be a happy gathering of the brethren on that occasion.

POLICE—Mary Brown, vagrant, was fined \$1 or 30 days. John Mullovers, drunk, was dismissed. Edward Hall was accused of assault, but there being no prosecution he was dismissed.

NOMINATIONS—Mr. Robert Smith, M.P., on Saturday again received the Reform nomination for the House of Commons from the county of Peel. Dr. Platt was nominated for the county of Prince Edward.

INSPECTION—On Thursday the Police Commissioners will inspect the cabs of the city. Those vehicles that do not come up to a certain standard will be condemned, and the owners will not receive a license. The cabmen will not like this announcement, but it is the suggestion of the travelling public.

PRINCE EDWARD RAILWAY.—The *Gazette* announces that Mr. W. S. Macdonald has relinquished his contract for the building of the Prince Edward County Railway. Mr. Macdonald, of Toronto, has been communicating with, and will meet the Directors on Thursday with a view of arranging preliminaries.
