The stalwart young and middle-aged yeomen and artizans of Ontario, who, in considerable numbers, are now leaving for the North-west, will be incomparably more valuable than importations from Europe. The Prairie Province is to be congratulated on the acquisition of citizens already more or less inured to the habits and acquainted with the necessities of a new country.

The nominations for the Quebec Ascembly took place yesterday. Under the old Tory plan, the abolition of which Sir John and his followers so stoutly resisted for their own party purposes, the nominations would have straggled over several weeks and the polling similarly. By the very much neater and fairer Reform plan the elections are now of course to be held simultaneously to the disadvantage of neither party. The polling takes place on Wednesday next, May 1st, and the present prospect is that the taxationists will be permanently relegated to the Opposition benches. A term of banishment from the power they have so shamefully abused may have an improving effect on the Quebec Tories, although, truth to tell, it has only added desperation and exasperation to the misconduct of their confreres in the Deminion Parliament.

Sir :- The wall of my house has been torn down and rebuilt again, but I assure you I have to bear the expense. After the wall was built up to a considerable height, somebody's sharp eyes discovered that it was over the street line; the City Surveyor was fauthwith employed, and I was declared to be a transgressor to about the space of eighteen uches. Now eighteen inches on the end of a fellow's nose might be something, for it might prove his descent, according to Darwin, from the elephans, but 18 inches at the end of a street would not seem to be such a great matter, and especially when under the circumstances, it was scarcely perceptible. However, the fact remained, and I have to account for

My explanation was this : measuring from 10 inches outside of one sidewalk to 10 inches outside of the other sidewalk, gave just 58 feet the width of Montreal Street, and presuming the silewalks to be in their proper places, I built my wall within ten inches of the eastern one. The City Surveyor has estabished the fact that both sidewalks were too far to the west, and consequently my
