Morris will not be the choice of the convention, we have had enough of him; and it is said from late advices that he considers his chance in the County of Marquette, Manitobs, equally discouraging since he left there, nothwithstand ing that he carries in his pocket a letter from Archbishop Tache, offering to hand over to him body and bones, some three hundred French Catholics votes in that

We also heard of him at Kingston few days ago, it is said, spying out the chances in the constituencies of Lennox and Addington. We wish them luck with him.
