PROROCATION

For all legislative purposes the third parliament of the Dominion of Canada is probably at an end. The Government could, if the exigencies of the country should demand it, again reassemble parliament for a short session before the expiration of the full five years for which it was elected. The writs for the present parliament were made returnable in March, 1874, so that by effication of time it will not be dissolved till March, 1879. Now that its fifth regular session has closed, however, it will be quite in order for the Ministry to bring on the general elections whenever, in their judgment, it may best suit the convenience of the electors to select their representatives for the next parliamentary term. The session which was terminated by to-day's prorogation has been by no means one. Although at opening of it the Leader of Opposition complained, in his well-worn formula, of the meagreness of the Bill of Fare as submitted in the opening speech, yet, as usual, the taunt has been completely bereft of all point by the copious supply of useful legislation which has been submitted to the House by the Government. SHIRKING THE VOTE.

Mr. Blake's absence from the House when the vote on the motion of Sir John reflecting on Governor Letellier was taken. As we pointed out at the time, the Hon. gentleman was all to consistent, even if he purposely refrained from voting, if he held that it was none of their business, as members of the Commons, to interpose in a matter of purely Provincial concern. On a recent occasion, however, a much more glaring case of "shirking the vote" eccurred in the House. When the motion for the subsidy to the Canada Central, as a part of the Pacific Railway scheme, was about to be put, Sir John Macdonald, although in the House up to that moment, bastened out of it to escape the vote. He did not dare to vote for it for fear of incurring the ill will of the Ottawa region, while, on the other hand, he was bound not to support this or any other part of Government Pacific Railway of giving the seat of Government to Ottawa, for which he was feted, and for which he personally claimed credit and support from the Ottawa people, Sir John, perhaps, thought they should be satisfied without expecting additional favours at his hands. Or, having done nothing whatever for Kingston, he might not wish to arouse Kingstonian discontent by unduly or unnecessarily interesting himself in the prosperity of a locality already sufficiently indebted to him. Whatever might have been the motive, the vote was dodged in the most cow ardly manner without exciting a single word of criticism from Tory organs.
