SIR JOHN'S POLICY. SIR JOHN BY HIS "NATIONAL POLICY" IS COMMITTED TO THE POLICY OF LAYING A TAX ON GRAIN AND COAL. SUCH A TAX WOULD RAISE THE PRICE OF EVERY TON OF COAL THE POOR MAN HAS TO BUY, AND EVERY SOAF OF BEARD HE EATS. THE TAX ON COAL WOULD ALSO INCREASE THE COST OF PRODUCTIONS—AN INCREASE IN THE COST OF PRODUCTIONS WOULD REDUCE THE PROFITS OF MANUFACTURERS—A REDUCTION OF THEIR PROFITS WOULD LOWER THE RATE OF THE WORKINGMEN'S WAGES. IT AT THE SAME TIME WOULD RAISE THE PRICE OF FUEL TO THE WORKINGMEN, AS WOULD THE TAX ON WHEAT RAISE THE PRICE OF HIS BREAD. SIR JOHN'S POLICY THEN WOULD WEAKEN SOME MANUFACTURERS, LOWER THE RATE OF WAGES, AND INCREASE THE COST OF LIVING.

LIBRARY SOCIETY. A regular meeting of the Collegiate Institute Literary and Debating Society was held last evening in the Institute building. After some business had been transacted, the programme of the evening was proceeded with, viz., a debate on the subject—Resolved, "That the present Administration should be supported at the next election." A public debate is to be held soon on the same subject by Messrs. Britton, Shibley, Duff and O'Reilly on the Liberal side, and a chosen four to defend taxation and corruption.
