More Hopeful of Peace-A Lult for a Time at Least.

(By Telegaph To-day.) London, May 20 .- All that is authentic is the corrent rumour that the two years' term of the occupation of Bulgaria may be shortened, the number of troops diminished, a European Commission appointed instead of a Russian, and a new scheme adopted regarding the payment of the indemnity.

FAMINE IN CHINA

(By Telegraph To-day.) Wasnington, May 20 - Minister Seward sends accounts of the Chinese famine up

to the middle of March. The district affected comprises parts of or the whole of the Provinces of Shansi, Chihli, Shantung, Shensi, Honau, Izhnew, and Kansu. Actual famine is pressing upon tifteen millions of people, while fully sixty millions are suffering. There is abundance of food in the country, but great lack of transportation. The crops have been good immediately around the stricken districes, but as food can only be transported on waggons or pack animals it cannot be taken thither in sufficient quan tities to save the people. The Chinese officials have done all that is possible. The Chinese have usually classed opium and missionaries as among the chief evils due to foreign intercourse, but the latter are now winning favour through the practical help they afford. There are numerous refugees from the famine district in Perkin and Prentsin. In the latter city a house maid of mats for the accommodation of suffering women and children was recently burned and 150 lives lost.
