The captain, an hearing the explosion and seeing the smoke, sprang from the bridge ordered the hose to be instantly applied, and by dint of extraordinary exertion on the part of himself, the officers and crew succeeded in saving several persons who were in the midst of the debris. The hold was flooded with water from the hose, but the smoke continued to pour out in dense volumes, and ultimately they had to abandon all hope of saving the ship except by opening the sluices and letting the water in. Before doing this the vessel was taken into five fathoms of water, so that when she settled down her decks would be above water, and she might be the more easily pumped out and raised. While these orders were being executed, the whole of the saloon passengers, assisted by many of the crew. were engaged in transferring the emigrants to the mail tender, which had just came alengside. About 300 or 400 soen crowded her decks, and she landed them at Moville pier, after which she returned does not corrode, and is nearly as thin for orders. ### The Potato Beetle,

It would seem that this destructive insect, to use the language of the N. Y Sun, "has come to stay with us." The hope that it would tarry but a brief space has well-nigh vanished. The entomological prophecy, that other insects would make their appearance and prey upon it, has failed of fulfilment. There is nothing for it but to fight the beetle if we would raise

A hand to hand conflict is the first that must be fought, whatever may be done afterwards. The mature beetles that appear early in the season must be caught and crushed. As each female beetle that escapes will lay from eight to twelve hun-dred eggs, the importance of making war on the old stock that comes creeping forth from its winter hiding-places will be at once apparent. The past winter has been so mild that there is reason to fear that they will swarm out in greater force than ever, hence the need of extra diligence to destroy the advance guard of the

beetle army. Next to destroying the egg-layers will come the task of searching for and crushing the eggs. These will be found deposited in yellowish clusters on the underside of the leaves. It is a tedious process to hunt for and destroy the eggs, but it is an excellent preventive measure and worth the trouble it gives. Later on, there is the disagreeable

work of exterminating the young grubs.

They are disgusting looking creatures, which nobody likes to handle. But they must be made away with, either by collecting them in some sort of receptacle, and killing them, or by scattering Paris green on them. A milk pan and a bit of cloth are good weapons to employ. A slight jar of the stalk will shake them into the milk pan, when they may be slaughtered in any way that is preferred. Those who wish to make a thorough job of "going for" this pest, and who have no fear of poisoning the tubers, will get Paris green. This must be manipulated carefully, as it is a virulent poison to human beings and stock of all kinds, as well as potato bugs. One of the lest methods is to mix it with flour in the proportion of one pound of the poison to fifteen pounds of the flour; mix carefully in a barrel, and apply with a tin sifter A genius who writes for the N. My method is to first teach bugs in meal and throwing them to the After having been fed a few times with the bugs in this manner they are called though the potato field and fed some grain or screenings by throwing it upon such hills as are infested with the bugs. It the feed is soant they will knock the bugs all off the vines and eat them up By following this plan during the entire season, beginning as soon as the bugs make their appearance, twenty-five or thirty hens will keep the bugs off from an
