TO-DAY'S OPINION. London, May 27. - Reports from all quarters go to substantiate the correctness of the statements made yesterday relative to the understanding between England and Russia and the probability of a Congress being held at Berlin on the 11th prox. This much appears to be certain, that the Congress will be held with general principles, and thus pave the way for a meeting of the ambassadors of the Powers at Constantinople, who will perfect the arrangements for replacing the Treaty of Paris and San Stefano by the Convention. Austria is said to have made overtures to England with a view to co-operation at the Congress, but she is understood to have shied at the idea of a distant understanding has been reached by England and Russia on matters affecting British and Russian interests, leaving other questions, such as the retrocession of Bessarabia and the indemnity for consideration by the Powers generally.
