(Mr. Mackenzie at Sarnia.) He entered into a full discussion of the protection question, showing that shile ree trade was impracticable, protection was an impossibility. Under a protective system, the duty placed upon the protected article instead of going into the treasury of the country, west into the pockets of the individual manufacturer. He instanced the case of the farmer who complained to him that American oats were sold in Canada to the injury of the Canadian farmer, and that a duty should be placed upon oats to prevent it from coming in. His reply was that the very fact that the American farmer was getting a lower price for his oats under a protective system than he could get in Canada under a revenue tariff system was the best proof possible of the fallacy of the claim that protection would bring higher prices to the farmer. (Applause) The fact was that protection would enrich a few manufacturers at the expanse of the farmers. He read from a table of exports and imports showing that the exports of cereals were greatly in excess of the imports and that it would therefore be absurd to suppose that a duty upon the quantity imported would increase the price of those exported. The eff of of the importations was simply that our brokers and carriers made money by the transaction. He represented an agricultural county, and knowing his position as such he resisted the attempt to introduce a protective system. It was not the firmers alone who would be injured by protection. The manufacturers were foremost in the agitation for protection. They had an agent travelling through the country preaching up the doctrine in their interests, an I had subscribed a fund of \$20,000 to assist in carrying the election of those who favored the protective system. The man who is not able with 174 per cent, in his favor, with the car riage of the goods in his favor, and with cheaper living in his favor, should go out of the business as one that he was totally unfitted for.
