Wounded Emperor's

Condition.

(By Telegraph To Day.) Berlin, June 6 .- At nine o'clock last night the condition of the Emperor Wilhelm still continued to improve. Nobiling remains unconscious, but he is closely watched, and any mutterings are noted. His younger brother has been arrested.
