ROBBERY. Singular to say Mr. Kennedy thought no more of his coat until this morning, when be missed the pocket book. The coat was not where he had left it; he found it banging in a hall between the kitchen and the bar. Detective Macaulay took the case in hand, but so far he has been unable to make anything out of it, nearly a day's start being given the thief, who by this time has no doubt made himself scarce about the city. Mr. Kennedy will be able to stop the use of the drafts and notes, but the currency is gone, and of its amount he is the poorer to-day.

Quite a Fire. About 1:30 o'clock this morning a fire commenced in Mr. Tomkins' outbuild ings, corner of Earl and Barrie Streets Before the firemen were called out and arrived at the scene of action the flames spread to the double tenement on Earl Street, owned by Mrs. Carrol, which was entirely destroyed. The back kitchen attached to Mrs. Reyner's house on Barrie Street was burned, but the main building was saved. The sheds in rear of Ald Gaskin's house on Barrie Street were also consumed; and the roof of a tenement in the yard, (also owned by Ald. Gaskin) was considerably damaged. The fire, it will thus be seen, covered quite a space, and made a great illumination while it lasted. The firemen were promptly on hand and worked hard, but they fought against many disadvantages, one being a want of water. There was not much insurance on the property. Ald. Gaskin's loss is partially covered. Mrs. Carrol has an insurance in the Canada Agricult iral Company of \$500; and Mr. Tom kins has a policy for a similar amount in the same company. We cannot say how the fire originated. Mrs. Carrol's houses were unoccupied, and one of Ald. Gaskin's was without a tenant.

Belleville has had a celebration of its Oswego, Cayuga, Kinghorn, canal boat dimensions were never so large as now, the population has wonderfully increased, Holcomb & Stewart's wharf-Arrivals: and the people have not had in the history of the past the same opportunity or occasion for uniting in one universal jubilee. Candidly steaking Belleville Marks. has made astounding progress. Its advancement during the past few years has been especially rapid. From a lively town it has developed into an bitions city, and its residents must pardoned if they anticipate great things, in a private and public sense, from their altered municipal relations. For some time before Dominion Day active preparations were going on in Belleville, for the anniversary on ciry's inauguration was to be celebrated, and hence, on Monday, extensive and pompous was the display of thrift and taste. The decorations and illuminations, field sports, games, arches, etc., were all contributions to the pro-

gramme of attractions; but the procesnion was the grand feature of the day, having been participated in by bands iremen, volunteers, citizens and trades nen, the latter of whom, by their repreentations of workshop labours, madthe moving panorama one of more than assing interest. The oration was de livered by Hon. Senator Flint, who remarked that his first recollections Believille went back to 1812 15. At that time the place was known of Myers' Creek, Captain Walter Myers being then a prominent man in the place. The original town plot was surveyed in 1816 and the present name given at the close of the war in 1815. The first steamer commenced running in 1818, under the command of the late Henry Gilde:sleeve, of Kingston. His first trip to Belleville was in May, 1822. Then the place was sparcely settled, and the mud knee deep Ports after a rain storm. There was but one church at that time in St. Thomas. He estimated at 56,000. went sgain in 1822, but did not observe much improvement. In 1829 he returned to Belleville and commenced business, there being at that time sixteen stores there, and one of the large stores now contains more goods than all the sixteen Europe on Thursday to assume the duties
