need to give up all idea of a turnip crop simply because it is too late for Swedes The failure of a first sowing from poor seeds, or from the ravages of the fly will sometimes leave a field that has been carefully prepared, in danger of lying fallow for the remainder of the season. Other circumstances may cause a farmer to be too far behind hand to sow Swedes to advantage. In all such cases t is well to put in other varieties, which are of quicker growth, and will mature a crop in the time that yet remains before the setting in of winter. The best of these varieties is the Greystone, which should be got in with as little delay as There are also the Yellow Aberdeen, and White Globe varieties, that may be sown even later. 
