The Ottawa Herald says that the "Grand Camp Excursion" from Ottawa to Rockingham was made over and more than 140 people have been caught in a snow storm. The whole thing was a mistake, a delusion and a snare, and there were many who were snared by it. The thing was a bad one. The manager appears to have said, "The 'Admiral' was the fastest boat in the river; water; that it was fitted up with all modern improvements, elegant, commodious, etc., whereas, in reality, it is an old, ravenous cutter, in no wise fitted for the carrying of passengers, though with coal she might be made to run at a moderate speed. No cabin, only seven star rooms, no dining table, no carpets, nothing to fit to afford any show of comfort to the excursionists. She afforded very little shelter from the elements, consequently the passengers suffered terribly. A table was made by the putting together of old boxes, and shoe-blacks appeared as waiters, whilst articles of food were wanting and the passengers had to turn to at times and eat dried for sustenance. This sort of thing was not very agreeable to people, especially ladies who had their money to enjoy a "grand excursion." From Kingston, the "Admiral" remained out on the lake all night until 5 o'clock in the morning, the passengers finding no place to sleep or rest themselves, the engines stating that he was beating time in obedience to the officials. This was a villainous fraud. The passengers were deceived and disappointed.

1812 Pensions.

UNDER THIS ACT, any person who served four years or participated in one battle in the War-of-1812, is entitled to a pension of \$100 per month, if disabled from the service or dead after service. Widows of soldiers who die after service, no matter what was the date of marriage to the soldier, are entitled to the same pension.

No other pensions are entitled.

All 1812 pensions dropped from the Rolls because of alleged disability are restored by this Act.

Applications must be executed before an officer of a court of record.
