DANCING. On Saturday evening a number of persons went by steamer Maud to Charnel Grove, where they enjoyed dancing until a late hour. The "departures" was a novelty. Mr. Briggs proposes to continue these sociable events so long as the season will allow.

LACROSSE. The Oka Lacrosse Club of Belleville has accepted the challenge of the Kingston Lacrosse Club, to play a match here on the civic holiday, for the silver cup which will be presented to the champion club between Belleville and Brockville.

ST. GEORGE'S PICNIC. VICTORIA WARD. The Aldermen of Victoria Ward and the City Engineer deserve praise for the road making done on Union Street, to level up the sides of the roadway to the common centre—the Street Railway track. THE ELECTIONS. We are informed that there is no truth whatever in the rumour that the General Elections will take place about the end of this month. As yet the Government has not determined when they will come off; however they cannot occur this month unless Sir John undertakes to dissolve the House and appeal to the country on his own hook.

SHIPMENTS OF FRUIT. Already large shipments of fruit have been made from American to Canadian ports. The "Magnet" has now full cargoes of this kind of freight each morning. On Saturday morning she landed at Swift's about 600 packages. Yesterday morning she had bills of lading for about 1000 packages. Between freight and passengers the Royal Mail Line is now most profitably employed.

THE MIDLAND FAIR. The Secretary has given notice of the dates on which the next Midland Central Fair will be held, and the announcement should be interesting to all classes of the community. The show will last for three days, and \$9,000 will be awarded in prizes, hence the importance of the event will at once appear evident. We hope the managers of the Fair will be supported in such a manner as that the exhibition will be a complete success.

THE MILITARY COLLEGE. The Canada College contains the appointment of Lieutenant Samuel Gerrard Fairbairn, R.A., to the staff of the Royal Military College. This officer arrived in the city on the 25th of July, but his appointment dates from the 18th. Notice is also given of the passing of the regulation examination of Greaves Syme Duffin, Halifax, who now becomes a cadet of the College.
