THUNDER AND LIGHTNING. A FEARFUL NIGHT.—DAMAGE BY THE ELECTRIC FLUID. The wildest and most alarming storm that we ever remember, and of which there has been any record in later years, occurred this morning, and it was such a disturbance of the elements as we hope may never again be felt.

A PERFECT FOREST. This lasted about three quarters of an hour, followed by a temporary lull, and then the tempest was resumed. From 6 to 6:30 the effect of it was awe-inspiring, and led to the greatest apprehension, since the lightning was of the fork rather than the sheet kind, and every time it struck was illuminated by an intense light.

DAMAGE IN NO LIGHT. As it appears to be. The results are most serious in the locality of Wolfe Island. There the new barn of Mr. John Baker, between the sixth and seventh divisions, was struck by the lightning, ignited and burned, with all its contents, including most of the yield of the season's harvest.

THE MOST SEVERE SHOCK. Was felt by Mr. A. Robinson, who lives in a tenement belonging to Mr. John O'Connor, Ryalsden Street. The electric fluid struck the chimney, thence travelled downward, but its course cannot be accurately traced.

AT GANANOQUE. Here the effects of the storm were felt to some extent. Two trees were felled, and a building was struck, but little damaged.

AT NAPANESE. The rain fall is calculated at 2.65 in., the heaviest of which Mr. Woods, M.P., meteorological observer, has any entry—and it is for the time it continued—and including it the precipitation since the 1st of July has been heavier than for the six months previously.

WHIGGINGS. —Hon. Mr. Boshard, Treasurer of Quebec, is seriously ill. —The assessment in Hamilton has been fixed at 18 cents on the dollar. —The imports for Toronto so far are about \$60,000 in excess of last year. —Messrs. Lightham & Son, of Belleville, shipped 500 sheep to England yesterday via Boston.

—The Orange Young Britons of Montreal, to the number of 400, intend visiting Ottawa on the 12th. —Twenty-seven out of the forty-five candidates in the examinations for chemists and druggists. —A large force of men are at work on the Pembina branch of the Canadian Pacific, and it is expected to be completed this year.

—Ill-timed distilling is said to be extensively carried on in Montreal. Several "distillery worms" have lately been seized. —It is said in Quebec that the remains of the late Bishop Conroy will be taken to Ireland for burial at his native place. —The Premier will not be able to go to Russia for three weeks yet. The picnic will be deferred till about the 1st of September.

—Big hail-stone stories are now in order in Toronto, and Dr. DeLoach reports one as large as his own fist, and weighed a pound and a half. —Canadian vessels, both steam and sail, are getting away with a good deal of wheat from Detroit just now. They carry to Kingston at it is said, 400,000 bushels. —A fatal railway collision occurred at Jersey Junction, on the St. Louis and Cincinnati Railroad, last night, by which twelve persons were killed and twenty wounded.

—The entire White Sulphur Springs (Vt.) water, consisting of eight thousand acres of land, was offered for sale Tuesday, but no higher bid than \$300,000 being received the sale was adjourned. —The Press Bureau of Constantinople warns editors not to use violent language or to insert any insinuations of a disagreement between the Porte and the Palace, or that the Government secretly resists the treaty.
