That is to say, round numbers they increased the public charges of Government in six years by \$10,000,000, or at the rate \$1,666,666 per annum. As compared with the above the estimate submitted by the present Government for the fiscal year of 1876-7 amounted to \$23,519,301, or an apparent increase over Sir John A. Macdonald's last estimate, of three years before, of \$202,985. This is at the rate of \$66.328 per annum.
