Council meeting.—The budget has been prepared by the Finance Committee and it will be submitted to a special meeting of the Council which will likely be held to-morrow evening. MEETING AT GANANOQUE. Speeches of the Hon. Messrs. Cartwright and Huntington.

ILLNESS OF THE PREMIER. Opposition Fallacies Exposed: THE GENUINE TOBY DEFINED: THE ISSUES BEFORE THE PEOPLE.

On Saturday a Reform rally was held at Gananoque. Considering that but a couple of days' notice of it was given, and that but some portion of the Riding were aware of it, the attendance was good, numbering at the very least nine hundred persons, most of whom were staunch supporters of the Government candidate, Mr. W. H. Frelenburgh.

The meeting took place in the Drill Shed, a portion of which was used for the occasion. It was intended that Hon. Mr. Mackenzie should be one of the speakers, but he had been so actively employed in his eastern tour that on his return to Ottawa he was ordered by his physician to take a short rest before resuming the campaign. His place was supplied by Hon. L. S. Huntington, Postmaster-General, and an orator in every sense of the word.

THE ORDINARY EXPENDITURE. When the late Government came into office in 1867 the ordinary charges amounted to \$5,630,000; when they left office in 1873 these charges had swollen to \$8,324,000—an increase of \$2,694,000. In the last recorded year of the late Government, the ordinary expenditure was diminished from \$8,324,000 to \$6,835,078; or instead of an increase it was only a decrease of \$1,488,922.

THE DEBT OF CANADA. The Government had been told that this was their own extravagance, though the remainder of the deficit was purchased by the late Government. COST THE COUNTRY \$62,000,000. (Applause.) He then referred to another argument of the Opposition. They were continually denying that the expenditure of the late Government was excessive. He thought that the men who brought down the estimates should be held responsible for the expenditure incurred thereon. If the Opposition insisted that the late Government was extravagant, he would make this proposition: to take from the expenditure of the year 1876-77 those items, which beyond possibility of doubt were incurred by the late Government before going out of office, and contrast the expenditure which remained with the expenditures of 1873-74, and if he did not convince them that the present Government was more economical than the late Government he would admit there was some ground for the Opposition charge of extravagance.
