THE RIDEAU CANAL. - From an old do The Rideau Canal office, the following interesting figures are taken. Pay of establishment, 110,279 pounds, 19 ahillings and 8 pence; cost of gates, 23,141 pounds, 6 shillings, 10 pence, 3 farthings; cost of land, 44,807 pounds, 12 shillings, 6 pence 1 farthing; expenditure upon the different stations, 625,545 pounds, 6 shillings and 5 pence. The total cost of the canal was thus 803,774 pounds, 5 shillings and 6 pence sterling, or over four million dollars. There are 47 locks in all, and 24 dams. The locks are each 134 feet long and 33 wide. The average depth of water in the canal is five feet. The work on the canal was begun on the 21st of September, 1826, and completed in August, 1832, six years being consumed in their constructions. THE FINANCIAL AGREEMENT.

WHICH IS THE EXTRAVAGANT PARTY! FACTS AND FIGURES WHICH DO NOT LIE.
