repeated at this time : DEAR SIR, -I attended the great pol tical demonstration of Wednesday night in favor of Sir John A. Macdonald, and, through the kindness of a friend, obtained a seat near the platform, so that heard distinctly every word spoken. It was a very crowded house, and John received a very hearty welcome from his political friends, as did also Dr.

Tupper on his account. The general impression left on my mi by the speakers was this, that if what was charged against the ministry was true, they were a set of the greatest incapables or greatest traitors to their trust, or such a compound of the corruptionist and the incapable as the world has rarely witnessed. But, without entering into particulars, we must remember, that these had been routed-horse, foot, and artillery - by the very men they were accusing. was the bitterest enemy seeking to damage the reputation of those who had driven him ignominiously from place and power. Men who for years had held in their right hands the destiny of Canada, but suddenly left in the House of Commons with a mere handful of followers demoralized and dismayed, were not very likely to be the most dispassionate judges of the men whose characters they pourtrayed.
