SIR JOHN'S POLICY.

Meaning of His Radical Hamburg.
SIR JOHN BY HIS "NATIONAL POINT" IS COMMITTED TO THE POLICY OF LEAVING A TAX ON GRAIN AND COAL. SUCH A TAX WOULD RAISE THE PRICE OF EVERY TON OF COAL FROM FOUR POUNDS TO SIX, AND EVERY TON OF GRAIN FROM FIVE TO SEVEN. THE TAX ON COAL WOULD ALSO INCREASE THE COST OF PRODUCTION—AN INCREASE IN THE COST OF PRODUCTION WOULD REDUCE THE PROFITS OF MANUFACTURERS—A REDUCTION OF THEIR PROFITS WOULD LOWER THE RATE OF THE WORKMEN'S WAGES. IT AT THE SAME TIME WOULD RAISE THE PRICE OF BREAD TO THE WORKINGMAN, AS WOULD THE TAX ON WHEAT RAISE THE PRICE OF HIS BREAD. SIR JOHN'S POLICY, THEREFORE, WOULD LOWER HOME MANUFACTURERS' WAGES, LOWER THE RATE OF WAGES, AND INCREASE THE COST OF LIVING.
