In ad dition to all this they bequeathed to their successors in 1873 a deficit of \$2,000,000 having exceeded their enormous revenue to that extent during the last year for which they were responsible for the pubtrenchment and economy. There has been practically no increase in the total public expenditure, there has been a vas decrease in the controllable outlay, as well as a decrease in the public debt there has been increased efficiency in the public service, and the country is now upon a sound financial basis.
