REMINDERS.

The re-count of votes in the Selkirk election yesterday, before Judge Betourney, declared that Mr. Donald A. Smith was elected. One vote was thrown off which reduces his majority to nine.

It is stated that the recently elected member for West Durham has intimated his willingness to resign in favor of Hon. E. Blake, whose defeat in South Bruce, most assuredly because he was absent from the riding but the country as well, has been regretted by leaders of all shades of politics. It has been conceded that Mr. Blake should have a seat in Parlia ment, and his election, while still in England, would be an honour of which the honorable gentleman is well worthy. W hope the proposition and the suggestion may both be realized.

PRINCE EDWARD.

As we intimated would be the case the day following the election, Dr. Plat has protested the return of Mr. James McCuaig, as the member in the House Commons for Prince Edward County. is said that corruption was rampant. that despite the stringency of the law the electorate was influenced by immoral means-and Dr. Platt and his friends claim that they have not only evidence enough to unseat Mr. McCuaig, but to disqualify him as well.

VICTORIAN LEGISLATION.

Closely following the repeal of the unconstitutional bill which aimed to specially tax the Chinese as a means of driv. ing them out of the Province, comes the information, that to prevent the deadlocks in the future, as they have fre. quently occurred in the past, the Victoria (British Columbia) Legislature contemplates passing a measure, by which any legislation upon which the Assembly and the Council cannot agree, will be sub mitted to the vote of the people, and ultimate and final action will depend upon the voice of the electorate. This seems to be a very happy idea of the Government of the day -a suggestive means of elipping out of responsibility which the Lagislative should shoulder, and for which in fact it was created and is main Why, if dead-locks are as common in the time to come as they have been, and supposing the Act to have been passed, the ratepayers will be doing that for which they pay and elect a Parliament, and in some respects the administration of public effairs will have been reduced to a laughable farce. To our mind such a course appears unconstitutional, but of that no surprise need be expressed with the record of years. British Columbia since Confederation before us. Failure of the Vatican Negotia-
