AFRAID OF HIM.

RESIGNATION.

The Belleville Intelligencer and other Tory journals have been impatiently cia. mouring for the resignation of Ministers. We knew that such was the sensitive honour of the Liberal leaders that they would not hold office a day-nay, not an hour-longer than the public interest imperiously demanded it; that as soon as ever the absolutely necessary routine the various departments could be wound up and transfer rendered possible that transfer would be made. We did think that possibly the Ministry would summon Parliament in the usual way, though at a much earlier than the usual date, and lay down their high trust in its presence This we still consider as the most digni fied course and that which would best interpret the intention of the Constitution. It was also said that the Ministry could hardly resign before the elections were completed. If yesterday's despatch prove true, however, the Ministry will not wait even for the final return from the constituencies, but will retire at once from their present positions as advisers of the Crown. We shall be glad if they do so for one reason at any rate It will at once throw the government the country into the hands of those of

The once proud prestige of this nation for military prowess seems to have well nigh, if not totally, disappeared.
