### THE MARKET BY-LAW.

THE NEW LIMITS WITHIN WHICH MEAT CAN

At the Council meeting last evening the Market by-law was finally passed and the following is an outline of it as

1. That after the first day of January next no butcher's meat shall be sold in any part of the City of Kingston within the following limits, namely-beginning rived. at the water's edge at the foot of Bay street, then westerly along Bay street to Barrie street, then southerly along Barrie street to the water's edge, together with the water in front of the said part of the city out to the city limits; and from the first of January next the law shall be strictly entorced against all persons selling meat within the said limits.

2. That outside these limits, but within the city limits, it shall be lawful for fresh meat to be sold by retail, and as well as by the carcase, under the regulations for inspection and cleanliness and wholesomeness of the meat from time to time; and the said by-law shall be altered in accordance herewith.

3. That any person offering for sale fresh meat within the limits prescribed in the first section of this by-law except in the public Shambles, or in public market number one, or exposing for sale meat contrary to the provisions of section two of this by-law, shall, on conviction by competent authority, be liable to a fine of not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, with costs, and in default of sufficient distress the offender shall be imprisoned in the Common Gaol for a period not exceeding twenty-

4. That all enactments contrary to this by-law are hereby repealed or altered in accordance with this by-law. 5. That this by-law shall take effect o he first day of January now next.
