#### SOUTHERN STORM. Devastation of Property-Loss of

(By Telegraph To-day.) New York, Nov. 5 .-- A letter has been received by the Rev. Mr. Kember from Bishop Holly, dated Fort Au Prince Oct. 8th, giving accounts of a severe storm which swept the Southern Coast Island Sept. 4th. He says over 400 houses were destroyed at Cayes, the Carribean Sea and several interior streams rising and fleoding the city. Large rocks were transplanted by the sea into the middle of the streets in some places and many lives were lost by persons being drowned or buried in the sand or transported by the sea with rocks and heaped up in mounds in the city. The residence of Rev. Mr. Leden was damaged and one of his sisters was drewned by the flood. Other towns of the South suffered in a like manner. Aquin and Cavall are completely destroyed. Over 60 persons lost their lives in the former place. Laus Averue was also visited by the tempest, but the damage is not so great. The misery of the inhabitants in these devastated cities is incalculable, and the Bishop suggests that some effort be put on foot to raise contributions for the sufferers. The Bishop of Hayti and Chapter associates with him in the offer to make a careful and equitable distribution of any contributions sent to their care.
