SOME DIFFERENCES.

There are several noticeable differences to be remarked between the elections after defeat of Sir John Macdonald and Hon. Mr. Cartwright. In the first place there was the great difference between celled Mr. O'Reilly's almost gazetted apparty victory and defeat, and all th's difference was of course in favour of Sir John. It is always easier for a defeated member of a victorious party to obtain a seat than for a defeated member of a defeated party to do so. There are more seats from which to obtain one, in the case of the triumphant party; there is also much greater prestige and enthusiasm in picking up an unhorsed leader of a victorious party than can possibly happen to a fallen leader in the rout of a defeat, and lastly, there is a greater prospect of personal reward to him who may step down and out in favour of a new case where place is made for a Minister just relegated to the cold shades of Opposition. All these differences operated in favour of the chances of Sir John, and against those of Mr. Cartwright in casting about for a seat after their respective defeats in the city of Kingston and County of Lencox. But we may pursue the comparison or rather the contrast a step or two further. In the case of each of the constituencies offered to Sir John the election had not yet been held, so that no one actually resigned his seat in favour of the Chieftain, as did Mr. Horton in favour of Mr. Cartwright. Most important difference of all, of the constituencies proffered Sir John, viz, Marquette and Victoria, were so tendered, for the most material and selfish of local reasons Mr. Ryan in Marquette was dissatisfied because the late Government had deter mined to give his locality the go by for the very good reason that it did not lie in the most direct route for our Pacific Railway across the continent. Marquette was for this reason eagerly anxious to give Str John a seat, inasmuch as the conferring this favour would place him under obligations to change the route, no matter at what public cost, to suit their interest and convenience.
