METHODIST SABBATH SCHOOLS.

A meeting of the Sabbath School Board of the Methodist Church of Canada was held recently in Toronto, Rev. Dr. Douglas, of Montreal, presiding. Arrangements were made for making grants to needy schools, for carrying on the work of examination and recommendation of library books, and for aiding in the improvement of the Sabbath School literature of the Church generally.

REORGANIZATION.

It is believed that a reorganization of the military system of the country will be made by the new Government. It is probable that a permanent force of five thousand men will be established, a full regiment of 800 being located at the following places in the Dominion: St. John, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston and Toronto. There will also be a couple of squadrons of cavalry. The volunteer force will be continued as at present. The Free Press adds: It is quite true that the creation of some sort of a permanent force in Canada is in contemplation, but the idea has not yet assumed any definite shape.
