OFF TO ENGLAND. The first symptom of earnest hurry on the part of our new Ministry has been so long in coming that it is worth recording. So anxious was Hon. Mr. Tilley to get to England that he took a special train last night in order to catch the Allan line steamer, which left for Europe to-day. What Mr. Tilley's errand to England is is a sort of Cabinet secret. It is conjectured, however, that in addition to the transaction of some financial operations rendered necessary by obligation incurred when in office before, Mr. Tilley is charged with ascertaining how far the Canadian Government dare go in erecting a hostile tariff here against the admission of British goods to the Canadian market. In the excess of its magnanimity the British Government may, at Mr Tilley's solicitation, consent to the exclusion of British manufactures from our markets pretty much as nearly every demand from the United States upon the British Government is, as a rule, generously complied with. The consent of the British Government to the erection of the Canadian Chinese wall, if accorded at all, will be a reluctant one, and one which will be accompanied by a pretty strong remoustrance. Whether it is obtained or not will not affect the disloyal ingratitude of our government in exacting it.
