THE FISHERY AWARD.

The Vigorous Protest of the N. Y. Herald. (Ly Telegraph Today.) New York, Nov. 12.-The Herald says that the amount of the Halifax award is about twice the per capita for each inhabitant of the United States. The number of our citizens is so small indeed who would not prefer to pay their share of the cost of the fishery award, than to witness a protracted strike on the subject, which would not only hurt our Government, but would not do for its views we trust it will not pursue the controversy. We are sorry that Congress rendered it necessary for the Secretary of State to make any representations at all. When we agreed to refer the question to arbitration we virtually bound ourselves to abide by the decision, whatever it might be. We can not honorably take any other course than to accept the award as it stands, and we are entitled to take advantage of our own imprudence or want of foresight.
